## A Healthy Church Is a Welcoming Church!

- "We who are strong have an obligation to bear with the failings of the weak, and not to please ourselves" (Romans 15:1).
- The point is that we must constantly seek to do what is for the good of others rather than what is for our own good. This does not mean that the weak control the church—that they have only to express a scruple and all rush to conform. That would mean that the church would be permanently tied to the level of the weak and that life and growth would cease. Paul is not laying down a rule of conduct but enunciating a principle of tender concern (Leon Morris).
- (Galatians 6:1-3 NLT) Dear brothers and sisters, if another believer is overcome by some sin, you who
  are godly should gently and humbly help that person back onto the right path. And be careful not to
  fall into the same temptation yourself. Share each other's burdens, and in this way obey the law of
  Christ. If you think you are too important to help someone, you are only fooling yourself. You are not
  that important.
- (Philippians 2:3–4 ESV) Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others
   more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the
   interests of others.
- (Ephesians 4:29-30 ESV) Let no corrupting talk come out of your mouths, but only such as is good for building up, as fits the occasion, that it may give grace to those who hear. And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, by whom you were sealed for the day of redemption.
- (Ephesians 4:31-32 ESV) Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put
  away from you, along with all malice. Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one
  another, as God in Christ forgave you.

## Old Testament written for our example and instruction ... (See also 1 Corinthians 10:6-12).

- The OT, though no longer a source of direct moral imperative (6:14, 15; 7:4), continues to play a central role in helping Christians to understand the climax of salvation history and their responsibilities as the New Covenant people of God (Douglas Moo).
- Although Christians live under the New Covenant and are not under the authority of the Old Covenant, God's moral law has not changed and all Scripture is of spiritual benefit (John MacArthur).
